## The Christmas Dinner 2014

Ah, the holidays! For many, it's a busy, hectic time. Still, the season just feels better when friends can be together. This year's December gathering saw 48 members and guests meet at the Cornerstone Wesleyan Church in North Gower. Happily, the night lacked deep cold or troublesome snow.

The Rideau Township Historical Society lost at least three current members in 2014: Lynne Webb, Joan Bakker and Coral Lindsay. All will be missed, but Lindsay's death feels like the passing of an era. She helped found our society in 1974 and made immense contributions across many decades.

Knowing all that, outgoing Program Director Ruth Wright opened the evening by reciting a poem that reflected Coral's legacy:

*Do not judge a song by its duration  
Nor by the number of its notes  
Judge it by the richness of its contents  
Sometimes those unfinished are among  
the most poignant...  
Do not judge a song by its duration  
Nor by the number of its notes  
Judge it by the way it  
touches and  
lifts the soul  
Sometimes those unfinished are among  
the most beautiful...  
And when something has enriched your life  
And when its melody lingers  
on in your heart  
Is it unfinished?  
Or is it endless?*

Wright shared the text with me by email, saying her fellow teacher's versatility and dedication made Lindsay a "... true face of RTHS, and she certainly did enrich our lives and touch our souls."

But back to the night itself. On behalf of Dickinson Square Heritage Management Inc. (DHSMI) Brian Earl presented RTHS a cheque for \$200 in tribute to Coral Lindsay's tireless work for heritage preservation in her birth village of Manotick.

Then it was time for the serious business of eating. While some miss the special diversity of a pot luck supper, the ease of sitting down to a reasonably-priced, catered meal was a real relief for those frazzled by a busy season.

We chatted over crudites before dining on turkey and ham, with potatoes, hot vegetables and salads. Dessert was fresh fruit, tarts and layered cake - with coffee or tea. Our caterer was Becky Russell, from North Gower. She had help from her mother, Hazel, and an Aunt. (In the

"small world" department, Russell attended North Gower/Marlborough Elementary School and had Wright as a teacher.)

Once all were good and full, it was time for the night's entertainment: a play and a carol sing-along. The play was written some time ago by Coral Lindsay. It is loosely based on real experiences from area settlers back in 1848. (Described in the first edition of Kars on the Rideau on page 61, as told by James McNiece of Kars.)

Master of Ceremonies, RTHS President Brian Sawyer, sported a traditional hat from far-away Kyrgyzstan. Sometimes called "the Switzerland of Asia" that mountainous, land-locked country is bordered by Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan and China. (Note: Sawyer's hat foreshadows January's meeting: the annual "bring and brag" night. It's not too early to start looking for your show and tell item.)

## News from the Rideau Branch, Ottawa Archives

**Resources and Services of the Rideau Township Branch of the City of Ottawa Archives:** a monthly feature in this newsletter, celebrating the services and holdings preserved in your community's archives resource centre.

The upcoming RTHS display on Main Streets of Rideau Township for the City of Ottawa's Heritage Day (17 February at City Hall) brings to my mind the old general stores that occupied a central location in the small communities of bygone days. We can easily imagine the vast array of goods that these stores made available to their communities: biscuits, stomach medicine, boots, nails, nutmeg, machine oil, tea, stove polish, wallpaper, sugar, books, soap, buttons, harmonicas, carrot seeds, moccasins, cordwood, and endless plugs of tobacco – a far wider assortment even than the modern dollar stores that have to some degree taken their place.

Thomas Salter's account books (MGR054) show that he sold all of these and much, much more at his store in Reeve Craig around the turn of the twentieth century. Sometimes the items he sold reflected the changing times: the nun's veiling he sold to William Beggs in 1894, for instance, had only become fashionable in the 1880s; the pink pills purchased by Augustus Arcand were more than likely Dr. William's Pink Pills for Pale People, a prod-

uct from Brockville, Ontario first produced in 1890 later to be distributed throughout the Commonwealth; and Paris green, made from copper acetate and arsenic trioxide, was a common insecticide in those days. And Salter's store, as was frequent for general stores, also served as the local post office, as the cancellation stamps on the flyleaf of one account book testifies. So there are records of postage paid on registered letters too. Ready money was rare, with credit being the primary means for making purchases, but the books also make note of some instances of bartering: Henry Keys got an American Waltham Watch in exchange for seven cords of green tamarack.

To get the goods on general stores, drop by the Rideau Township Branch to check out our wares, and, for a glimpse at the Main Streets in the area's history, drop by the RTHS booth at Heritage Day.
