Topic: Ottawa Police Services 150th Anniversary

Michael Houston received his formal photographic training in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1976 where he attended the Canadian Forces School of Aerospace, Ordnance and Engineering. Posted to Ottawa at the Canadian Forces Photo Unit, he performed a variety of different functions, from technical to portrait photography, film processing and printing, as well as a tour with the motion picture unit.

Starting in 1983 with the Ottawa Police, he took the department from hand-processing black and white into a full colour processing facility. Twenty-three years later, he leads a team into the future with a state-of-the-art lab. He is also a Certified Photographic Consultant.

On his own time, he hosts a morning show at a local radio station, and teaches Continuing Education photography and digital imaging courses at Algonquin College.

Michael Houston prepared a video and CD of his research for the 150th anniversary of the Ottawa Police Services in 2005 and has 3000 scans for this project.
