Speaker: Coral Lindsay, keeper of the flame for Lindsay's Wharf

Topic: The Lindsay family and Lindsay's Wharf, 1834-1935

Ledgers, family documents, photos and folklore provide a record of the steamboats coming in and leaving the wharf throughout the century. The boats brought settlers, mail, commodities and freight into the wilderness and carried away produce from farm and forest. Find out what the pioneers could buy at Lindsay's Store. You might be surprised!

The Lindsays

As the soldier sons of Ivar, Great Jarl of the Norse, they established vast colonies in Normandy and Lincolnshire during the 10th century and wielded battle-axes with William at Hastings in 1066. The Lindsay noblemen served at the court of King David I of Scotland. They built castles and estates to defend their monarchs and their religion throughout the centuries. "The lightsome Lindsays" were and are known for their humour, love of music, law and justice.

Because of the severe economic depression after the Napoleonic Wars, William and Annie (Campbell) Lindsay embarked with their seven children on the sailing ship David of London in May, 1821, leaving Lanarkshire, Scotland, for Lanark County, Upper Canada, never to return. They made the Great Trek overland from Prescott to the wilds of Ramsay to earn a living as farmers instead of weavers on the shores of the turbulent Mississippi River.

Their second son James and his wife Ellen Goodwin settled in North Gower Township beside the Rideau in 1829, established Lindsay's Wharf by 1834 and contributed to the development of commerce, industry, agriculture, church, school and community through 7 generations.

Lindsay's Wharf closed when the last Rideau steamer, the Ottawan, made her final voyage in 1935. Farewell to the old Lindsay's Wharf.
