Claire Smith was a former member of the Canadian Equestrian Team in the '90s. She competed in the 1994 World Equestrian Championships. She also travelled to the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia, where she placed 14th, with her late gelding, Gordon Gibbons.

At the European Championships in Great Britain in 1997, Claire suffered a disastrous fall when her horse flipped over a jump. She was hospitalized for 6 weeks before returning to Canada. She then spent time in the St. Vincent's Hospital in Ottawa, where a brain trauma unit is located.

RTHS June Excursion

We had a beautiful warm day for our trip this year. We left from the North Gower Client Centre and headed first to the Pinhey's Point Historical Site, which is on the Ottawa River close to Dunrobin. The Pinhey Estate is an 88 acre heritage park and house that is currently owned by the City of Ottawa. The house was originally built by a London, England merchant by the name of Hamnett Pinhey who emigrated to the area around 1820 to reinvent himself as a landed gentleman in the colonial frontier.

The manor itself is preserved as much as possible to how it would have been in the mid-1800's. The guides we had for the tour were very informative and gave a fascinating account of how the manor operated at the time. After the tour of the manor house, we were taken to the adjoining cemetery and church ruins by Bruce Elliott who gave us a very full accounting of the people and families who had lived at Pinhey's Point and were buried in the church cemetery. In short, for those who have not been to Pinhey's Point, it is well worth a visit.

After our tour of the Pinhey's Point grounds, we went to the new St. Mary's Church built in 1909 which replaced the original church. It is a beautiful little church which is well cared for.

Our next stop was a brief visit to Camp Woolsey which is a Girl Guide Camp at nearby Crown Point. We toured an historic cottage at the camp which was named after a member of the family, Anna Pinhey, who donated funds for its restoration and ongoing support.

Having worked up a good appetite, we stopped for lunch at *The Glen Restaurant* in Stittsville before heading on to our last stop at the St. Clare Mission Church on Dwyer Hill Road. The original church was a small wood chapel 40 ft. by 30 ft. which was built in 1849. The original church was replaced in 1915 with a church on the opposite side of the

road. The current church is architecturally unique with a steep pitched roof and has beautiful stain glass windows. Well worth a visit if you are in the area.

That completed a full day of touring some beautiful historical sites and structures which are right in our own back yard.

Attic Treasures Appraised at the North Gower Farmers' Market

On Saturday 11 August, Rideau Branch of the City of Ottawa Archives teamed up with the Rideau Township Historical Society for a special event at the North Gower Farmers' Market's annual Heritage Day.

While Susan McKellar, Georgie Tupper and Ruth Wright sold publications on local heritage topics at the RTHS booth, Rideau Branch set up just opposite with a few panels from its current exhibition on local community involvement in the First World War, entitled "The Ties that Bind."

The Branch also held a travelling antiques appraisal session, evaluating and commenting on a number of local family heirlooms and historical items that were brought in. Rideau Branch volunteer Owen Cooke, former Chief Historical Archivist for the Directorate of History and Heritage, Department of National Defence, was on hand to give comments and advice on militaria, while Rideau Branch archivist Stuart Clarkson responded to queries concerning antique books and coins.

They were joined by the City Archivist, Paul Henry, who assisted market-goers with lithographs, textiles, and other materials. Highlights included a painting on ivory of a British officer in India, Dutch coins dating back to the Napoleonic era, and a set of blue handblown glassware, consisting of five tumblers with a pitcher decorated with an enamelled motif. Rideau Branch thanks Rideau Township Historical Society and the Farmers' Market Association for this opportunity to celebrate Heritage Day at the Market.

In Memoriam




Atsuko Cooke (née Yamanaka) died suddenly Saturday, September 8, 2018 of a brain haemorrhage. Atsuko was born in Wakayama, Japan, and attended primary and high school there and in Osaka. She received a B.A. in English literature from University of Osaka, then a B.L.S. from University of Toronto and an M.L.S. from McGill University. She followed a career in public service as a librarian and information officer, first with McGill University, then with the federal government with Canadian International Development Agency, Health and Welfare Canada, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the International Development Research Centre.

Always passionate about art, following retirement she studied at Ottawa School of Art and exhibited in many venues. She was a member of the North Gower Artists' Society and the Go-Figure Group at Burritts Rapids. Some of her figure work will be featured in the Merrickville Art Guild Studio Tour, 22-23 September in Burritts Rapids.

A resident of North Gower for more than forty years, Atsuko leaves behind her husband Owen and sister Makiko in Wakayama as well as nephews and nieces and their families in Japan.


